Summer reading provides students with an opportunity to maintain educational momentum while exploring topics of interest. It is important to read outside of the classroom. Over the summer, each student should read multiple books, articles, essays, comics, poems, and song lyrics for pleasure. Reading widely and broadly offers an improved perspective and increases our ability to empathize with others.

All summer reading work will be offered as extra credit with the exception of AP students. The reading for AP courses is mandatory but AP courses are elective.

Write a handwritten reading journal by summarizing each chapter in your own words. In your summary you can discuss the plot, the setting, the character development, and any themes you notice. You may also include connections to your own experiences or other texts, as well as predictions about what might happen next in the story. Each journal entry should be at least 5-7 complete sentences.

Write a handwritten reading journal by summarizing each chapter in your own words. In your summary you can discuss the plot, the setting, the character development, and any themes you notice. You may also include connections to your own experiences or other texts, as well as predictions about what might happen next in the story. Each journal entry should be at least 8-10 complete sentences.

(Grade 9) - English 1 Honors

Students may pick one book and complete a literary analysis essay. In the essay, provide a critique of the author's choices (structure, characterization, word choice, etc.), identify the theme of text, and examples of connotative and figurative language that led to your understanding of the theme of the text.

Complete a handwritten reading journal by writing a summary of each chapter in your own words. You can discuss the plot developments, themes, the setting, character development, and any symbols you notice. 2. After viewing the film (and taking notes), complete the following 3 parts in a Google Slideshow.

Format:

- 1. Title your presentation with the title of the film you watched
- 2. Include headings for each part of the presentation: Part 1, Part 2, Part 3.

<u>Part 1:</u> Summarize the Plot in three slides. This can be bullet points but it must include the main characters, their motivations, and the main plot events of the film. Please use your own words and do not include any Al generated content. Plagiarism will not be tolerated.

<u>Part 2</u>: Define the psychological terms for your chosen film (These are listed below). This can be done in a list format. Use the posted psychology textbook or another vetted source for information.

<u>Part 3:</u> Relate/Apply the psychological terms from Part 2 to the film. Describe **HOW** each term relates to the film: a character, a scene, or a situation from the film. You should write at least 3+ sentences for each term. You should **also include** details, examples, specifics from the film in order to support your claims as to the application. <u>Bold</u> each term in your answer. Each term should be applied as its own and not included as a giant paragraph. (Terms are listed below for each film). This will be multiple slides.

I will look at each presentation and ask for at least one student for each film to present. The slideshow MUST be **your own words** (other than direct definitions), edited, visually appealing, and insightful with regard to the psychological terms and their connections to the film. DO NOT USE AI FOR THIS PROJECT.

Terms for Each Video for Part 3

One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest- clinical psychology, mental institution, persistent depressive disorder, electroconvulsive therapy, psychosurgery, same-sex orientation, Tourette's Syndrome, insanity, psychiatric nursing.

A Beautiful Mind- clinical psychology, diathesis-stress model, paranoid schizophrenia, hallucinations, delusions, dopamine, biomedical therapy, antipsychotic medication, tardive dyskinesia

Rain Man- autism-spectrum disorder, neuropsychology, savant syndrome, mental institution, clinical psychology, memory recall, retrieval cues, hippocampus, narcissistic personality disorder.

As Good as It Gets (1997)- obsession, compulsion, obsessive-compulsive disorder, specific phobia, anxiety, James-Lange theory of emotion, personality disorder, social anxiety disorder, psychiatry

Shine (1996)- authoritarian parenting style, child prodigy, savant syndrome, repression, PTSD, bipolar disorder, fixation, diathesis-stress model, ECT
